The story of the *Catholic Social Science Review* is a case-study of my mentor's remarks. We are grateful that he has agreed to keep his name in association with our work, and look forward to a long time of relying on him for advice.

From the beginning, the *Review* has been exactly what Joe Varacalli called it: a labor of love. Each issue is put together by an editorial team made up of volunteers, who contribute their time and talents for a cause that they believe in, and I am continually impressed with what this team has accomplished and continues to do. Our publisher, Steve Krason, and the associate and assistant

editors, all make enormous efforts to produce a first-class volume of scholarship. I give my most sincere thanks to everyone involved in the effort, but especially Professor John Schrems and his associate Margaret King, who do the difficult and detailed work of preparing manuscripts for publication.
