Thomas Behr's "Luigi Taparelli and Social Justice: Rediscovering the Origins of a 'Hollowed' Concept" will be out shortly in volume 1 of *Social Justice in Context* (Carolyn Freeze Baynes Institute for Social Justice, East Carolina University).

Richard Cain, Wheeling Jesuit University, was appointed chair of the Department of English, Communications, and Fine Arts, in May 2004.

Patrick Foley reports that he and Donald J. D'Elia have finished editing for Sapientia Press the manuscript for the book, forthcoming in 2006, *The Catholic as Historian*. It is a book containing essays by eleven well-known Catholic scholars from throughout the United States and Europe. Patrick Foley also has finished a major biography of the first Catholic bishop in Texas and second Archbishop of New Orleans, the French prelate Jean-Marie Odin. C.M. The manuscript is under publication consideration by Texas A&M University Press. Foley also has been named to the Editorial Board of the scholarly journal of the *California Mission Studies Association*, Boletin.

Professor Garry has also published in such periodicals as *The National Catholic Register*, *The Washington Times*, *Insight*

Magazine, and *The Ripon Forum*. His book, *Wrestling with God: The Court's Tortuous Treatment of Religion*, will be published in 2006 by The Catholic University of America Press. In addition to religion, Professor Garry has also focused on First Amendment issues involving indecent speech. His scholarly articles have appeared in *The University of Pittsburgh Law Review*, *Southern Methodist University Law Review*, *Temple Law Review* and *San Diego Law Review*. He has also been invited to testify before a U.S. Senate subcommittee investigating obscenity regulation. In the summer of 2006, Transaction Press will publish Professor Garry's book, *Rediscovering a Lost Freedom: The First Amendment Right to Censor Unwanted Speech*.

Robert F. Gorman, Professor of Political Science at Texas State in San Marcos, TX, was consulting editor for *Great Events from History: The Twentieth Century: 1910-1940*, 5 volumes (Pasadena, CA: Salem Press), forthcoming in 2006.
